





















Why Manage Winter Motorized Recreation?

Displace caribou – Winter motorized recreation can push caribou out of optimal or more optimal habitat and into less optimal habitat.

Disturb caribou – The noise from winter motorized recreation and human presence can disturb caribou which results in greater energy expenditure and / or increased stress hormones.

Increased predation – Winter motorized recreation creates hard packed linear disturbances that allow predators to move through the landscape more efficiently in the winter which can provide access to caribou range and increase predation.







Clause 37 of the Intergovernmental Partnership Agreement

Shared Recovery Objective:

"....immediately stabilizing and expeditiously growing the population of the Central Group to levels that are self-sustaining and support traditional aboriginal harvesting activities, consistent with existing Aboriginal and Treaty rights."

- Collaborative design and implementation process with Partnership Agreement Parties
- Consultation with First Nations, Technical Experts, Local Government and Snowmobile Sector
- Closures, enhancements, and other measures consistent with similar plans in BC





Management Plan Objectives

Primary objective:

 Manage winter motorized recreation in a manner that supports the achievement of the Shared Recovery Objective.

Secondary objectives (where they do not conflict/ detract from the primary objective):


- Maintain use of the highest value and most unique winter motorized recreation areas and a diverse mix of winter motorized recreation opportunities in the region.
- Support the development or enhancement of winter motorized recreation destinations in areas that likely represent a low risk to caribou recovery, in order to support the region's winter motorized recreation visitor economy.
