SOUTHERN INTERIOR MULE DEER UPDATE
MULE DEER MORTALITY




Common sources of mule deer mortality include cougars, wolves, people and cars. Bears, bobcats and coyotes are also known to occasionally prey on mule deer.

Survival of adult does is typically 85-92%.

Deaths per study site in 2018

Cache Creek: 32 collared does Mortalities - 0	
Kettle/Granby: 21 collared does Mortalities - 2 cougar, 1 unknown, 1 suspected drowning, 1 apparent grizzly predation	
West Okanagan: 11 collared does Mortalities - 1 vehicle collision

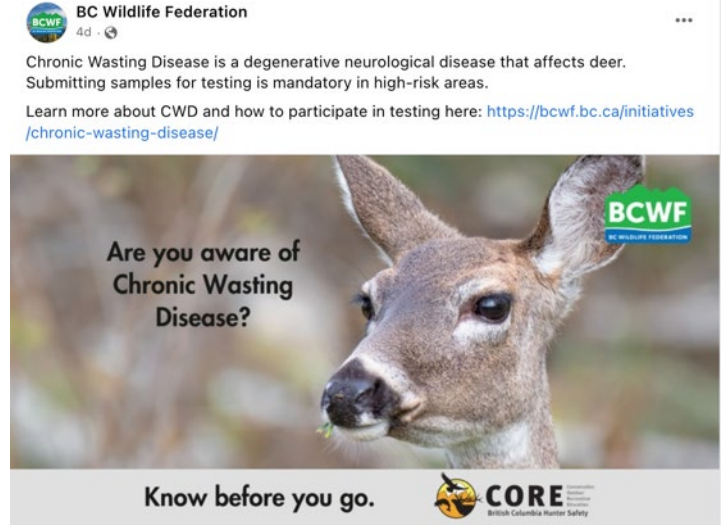

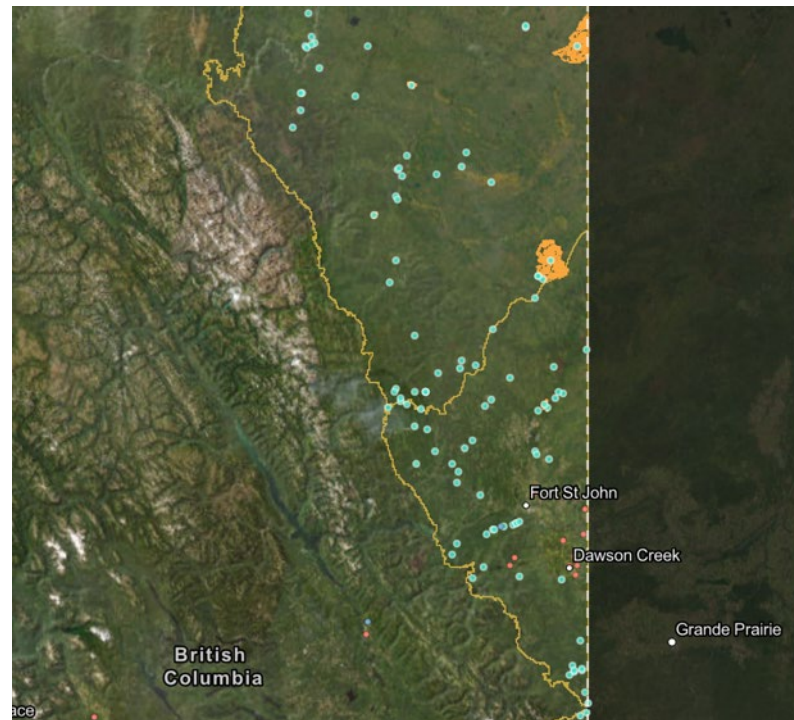
WILD KIDZ V: AUGUST 22-26

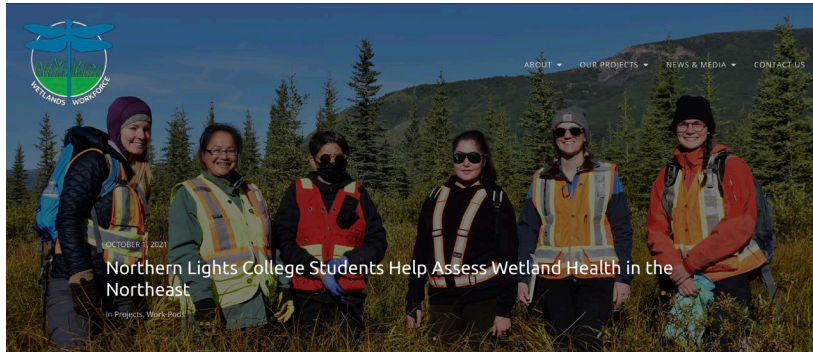

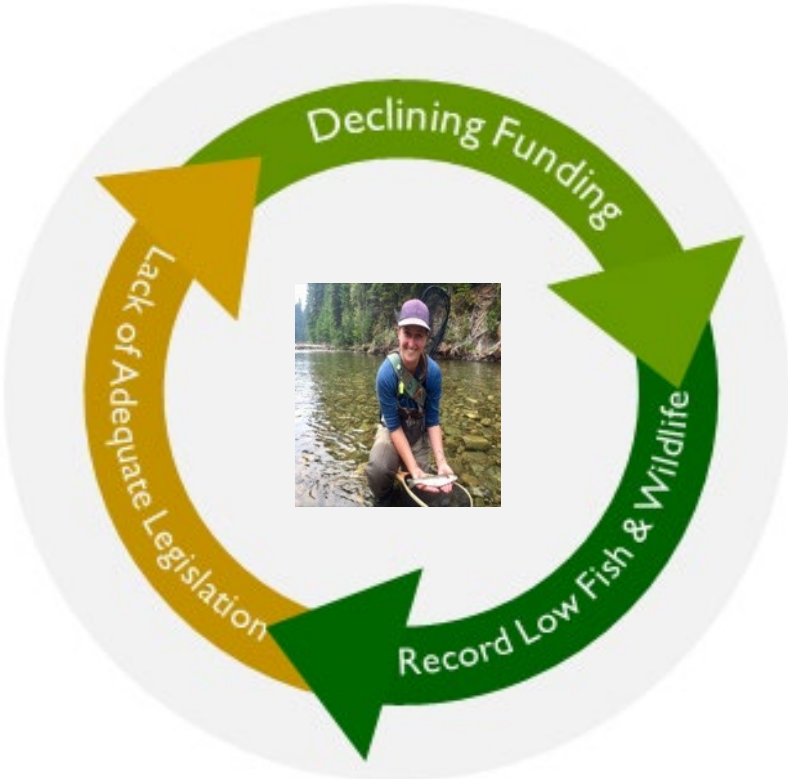

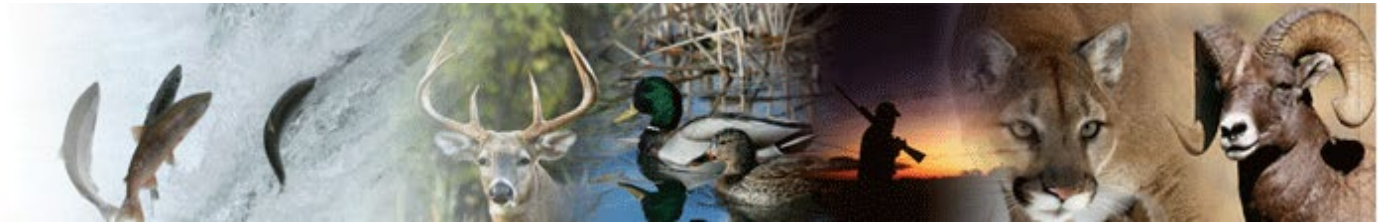
BC as a global leader in FWH Management: Meeting the Public's Expectations

- Objectives for FWH, all management levers being applied
- Funding is dedicated and spent on-the-ground
- FWH are enshrined in legislation
- Resource extraction is balanced with FWH
- Jobs are created in the sustainable economy
- Reconciliation moves forward through shared values
- Food security is improved



Short-term Priorities

- Regional Wildlife Advisory Committees
- Dedicated Funding
- Increased conservation (30x30/Nature Agreement)
- Land-Use Planning and linkages to Regional Operations
- Reduce the Annual Allowable Cut
- FRPA regulations - strike “not unduly reduce the supply of timber”
- Controlled burns and post-fire management



Long-term Priorities

- Ecosystem Health legislation that applies to all sectors per OGSR – combined with enabling updates to other laws, policies and regulations
- Legislated objectives for fish, wildlife and habitat. Objectives included in the Service Plan
- Collaborating on the creation of Indigenous Protected and Conserved Areas
- Dedicated, permanent and coordinated funding mechanisms
